nations; and the older son will serve the younger son."

This was unusual, because it was always the oldest son who would inherit the largest share of their father's property, and would also be in charge of the whole family; this was called a birthright.

The first twin born was very red and hairy and they named him Esau; then Jacob was born straight afterwards, holding Esau's heel!

As the boys grew up, Esau became a skilful hunter, while Jacob preferred to stay at home. Isaac loved Esau the best because he enjoyed the food Esau brought home, but Rebekah loved Jacob most. One day Jacob was cooking when Esau arrived home tired and hungry. Esau said to Jacob, "I'm starved! Give me some of that stew!" "All right," Jacob replied, "but only if you give me your birthright." "I'm dying of starvation!" said Esau. "What good is my birthright to me now? You can have it." So Jacob gave Esau some bread and lentil stew.

Many years passed and as Isaac grew old he also became blind. One day he called Esau and said, "Take your bow and hunt some wild game for me, then I will give the birthright blessing."

But Rebekah overheard. She quickly prepared food, dressed Jacob in Esau's clothes and covered his arms and neck with the skin of a young goat. Jacob took the food to his father and when Isaac touched the goat skins he believed it was Esau. Then Isaac ate the food and spoke the birthright blessing for his son.

When Esau came Isaac asked him, "Who are you?"


Esau replied, "It's your son, your firstborn son, Esau."

Monday


In many cultures today, families are very different than in Bible times. Many families consist of as a father, mother and children, sometimes they include aunties and uncles, but in Bible times, the only oldest son inherited the position as head of the family. He inherited ALL of his father's property and was in charge of all of the members of his father's family: including his own brothers and their children. It was his RIGHT - because he was born before them - his birth-right. Of course he didn't actually receive his birthright until his father died, or as in the case of Jacob and Esau, until the father, feeling that he might soon die, chose to pass on the responsibility and privilege.

Things have changed a lot since then and instead of remaining in the family home for life, adult children usually leave to get their own jobs and start their own homes, and somewhere between birth and adulthood, each person must learn to be responsible for themselves.

If you have brothers or sisters in your family, you may have noticed that the older ones get more privileges. Perhaps they can stay up later, go more places and make more of their own decisions. Have you also noticed that they have more responsibilities? More chores to do, things to look after, decisions to make and more things they have to do for themselves that your parents do for the younger kids? That is part of growing up. Becoming more responsible, but at the same time, gaining more privileges.

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The <u>birthright</u> <u>meant</u> that when their <u>Father died</u> the oldest <u>son would</u> <u>become the head of</u> <u>the family</u> . <u>Wednesday</u>
