Then I saw in my dream, that Christian thought awhile. And Hopeful added this word, "Be of good cheer, Jesus Christ maketh thee whole."





People who work longer are usually paid more than people who only work a short time.

<u>Sunday</u>

Jesus told the following story about workers and pay:

The Kingdom of Heaven is like the landowner who went out early one morning to hire workers to pick grapes in his vineyard.

He found some men and agreed to pay them the normal daily wage and so they went to work.



 \oplus At nine o'clock in the morning he was passing

through the marketplace again and saw some people standing around doing nothing. So he hired them too, telling them he would pay them whatever was right at the end of the day.

At lunchtime and again at three o'clock he hired more workers.

At five o'clock that afternoon he was in the marketplace again and saw some more people standing around doing nothing. When he asked them why, they said, "No one hired us today."

The landowner told them, "There is still one hour left to work, go out and join the others in my vineyard."

That evening he told the foreman to call the workers in to be paid, beginning with the last workers first.

Those who were hired at five o'clock were paid first, and each received a full day's wage. Those hired during the day were also paid a day's wage.



When those hired first came to get their pay, they assumed they would receive more. But they, too, were paid a day's wage.

They protested, "Those people worked only one hour, and yet you paid them as much as you paid us. It's not fair! We worked all day in the scorching heat."

The owner replied, "Didn't you agree to work all day for the usual wage? I wanted to pay this last worker the same as you. It is my money. Should you be jealous because I am kind to others?"

In the parable of the workers, did you notice the reason those who started working at 5 o'clock gave when asked why they were not working? (Matthew 20:5)

It was not that they did not want to work.

Now imagine in the same parable, if there were people who didn't really want to work, they want to do their own thing and then only work a short day. If they finally start looking for work at 5 o'clock, they might get some, but more likely there would be no vineyard owners in the market at that time and they would miss out.

Sometimes young people think they want to do things their own way and wait to decide for God until they are old. Some people do repent on their death beds, but for many it is too late. Just as the river in Pilgrims Progress is different for different pilgrims, none of us knows when or how we will die. We might be old, but we might be young. We might have warning, but it might be sudden. We might have good mental and physical health, but we might not.

As Solomon concluded in Ecclesiastes 12:1_{NLT}, "Don't let the excitement of youth cause you to forget your Creator."



The religious leaders realised that Jesus was talking about them, and they wanted to arrest Him immediately, but they were afraid of what the people would do, so they said nothing, and went away.


